Reimagining the Romantic









Franz Schubert's String Quintet in C Major, D. 956 stands as one of the most revered compositions in the Romantic chamber repertoire. Originally composed in 1828, just months before Schubert's untimely death, this quintet captures a profound spectrum of human emotion—from joy and tranquility to longing and sorrow. Now, in an innovative reimagining, this saxophone quartet with a guest saxophonist, breathes new life into Schubert's masterpiece, offering audiences a fresh lens through which to experience its timeless beauty.

Lusitanian Rêverie

A Lusitanian Reverie transports listeners through the wistful landscapes, seascapes, and cultural richness of ancient Lusitania. In this reverie, the music of Erik Satie and Carlos Paredes intertwines, painting a dreamscape of rolling hills and rugged coastlines meeting the Atlantic. Satie's gentle, melancholy melodies and Paredes' expressive, soul-stirring guitar compositions mirror the maritime winds that carry tales of explorers, fishing villages, and an enduring spirit of saudade—the Portuguese word for an untranslatable, profound longing. Together, Satie's delicate harmonies and Paredes' haunting themes capture both the mystery and warmth of this windswept land, evoking a timeless landscape that feels both distant and deeply familiar.
